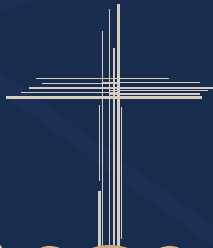

The Legacy of **REVEREND ANGUS THOMPSON**

Reverend Angus B. Thompson, born February 13, 1939, in Kilgore, Texas, was a devoted civic and religious leader whose life was defined by service, faith, and a deep commitment to justice. From his early days as a student-athlete to his decades of leadership in education, community development, and ministry, Rev. Thompson left an enduring mark on every life he touched.

Early Life, Education, and Military Service

Rev. Thompson received his early education in Kilgore, Texas. He began his high school journey at Booker T. Washington High School, in Wichita Falls, where he played football under the legendary coach Ervin Garnett. He later returned to Kilgore to graduate from C.B. Dansby High School in 1958, earning the distinction of salutatorian. He enrolled at Midwestern State University, but his studies were interrupted when he was drafted into the U.S. Army, but in true ABT fashion, he chose the Navy instead. He served honorably during the Vietnam Conflict, an experience that shaped his lifelong commitment to service and leadership.

During his time in the military, Rev. Thompson met Shirley Houston, the love of his life. They married in 1964 in Lufkin, Texas, and the Lord blessed them with four beautiful children: Renate, Yolanda, Omar, and Monica.

Career and Civic Leadership

Rev. Thompson's professional journey began at Region 9 Education Center, where his mentor, Dr. McBride, then Director of the center, recognized his leadership potential. Upon McBride's resignation, Rev. Thompson was appointed interim director. While serving Region 9, he joined the board of Community Action Corporation (CAC) North Texas, an agency dedicated to supporting underserved populations. Rising through the ranks, Rev. Thompson became Executive Director, a role he held for 34 years. Under his leadership, CAC opened the first area food bank, expanded vital programs such as HeadStart, Meals on Wheels, and housing services, and championed recovery support and transitional housing.

Rev. Thompson's passion for social justice was unwavering. Even while leading CAC, he remained deeply involved in grassroots organizing. His work was never confined to boardrooms. He marched, protested, and preached for equality, even in the face of threats to his safety. These efforts laid the foundation for his political career, where he served 12 years as District 2 City Councilman, including 8 years as Mayor Pro-Tem.

Rev. Thompson's civic contributions were transformative. He helped establish the MLK Center, fought discriminatory hiring practices, and played a key role in developing the Softball Complex, Kay Yeager Coliseum, and Wichita Falls' waterfall. He advocated for the construction and lighting of the Emanuel M. Davis Overpass, improving transportation access for Eastside residents. He also supported improvements to the Downtown Library and Red River water treatment initiatives. Appointed by former Governor Preston Smith to the inaugural Texas Human Relations Commission, he also served on the boards of the Community Healthcare Center and Public Broadcasting in Wichita Falls, and was honored to deliver the opening prayer at the State Capitol.

Ministry and Community Impact

Rev. Thompson's spiritual journey was central to his life. He sought the Lord earnestly and understood that true service required divine guidance. With the revelation that God had a calling on his life, he first pastored Macedonia Baptist Church in Quanah, Texas, for five years before founding New Jerusalem Baptist Church in Wichita Falls. This ministry was born from a vision to serve the community more deeply.

Under his leadership, New Jerusalem became more than a place of worship—it became a beacon of transformation. He launched Operation Fresh Start, which revitalized neighborhoods, renovated homes, and restored dignity to families in need. The church provided food and clothing distribution, installed air conditioning for seniors, and ensured children received holiday gifts and shoes. He was passionate about no one in the community feeling forgotten. Rev. Thompson believed that ministry must meet people where they are, and he empowered his congregation to be the hands and feet of Christ in every corner of the city.

Also under his guidance, New Jerusalem Baptist Church partnered with WFISD through a robust school adoption program, supporting six campuses: Legacy High School, Hirschi Middle School, Kirby Middle School, Booker T. Washington, Scotland Park, and Kate Burgess Elementary. Volunteers mentored students, assisted teachers, and organized seasonal drives tailored to each school's needs. A cornerstone initiative was the Back-to-School Backpack Program, which provided backpacks filled with school supplies. This program, often paired with clothing and coat drives, was spearheaded by Rev. Thompson to ensure every child felt seen, supported, and prepared.

Education and Personal Passions

Rev. Thompson earned both his BA and MS in Political Science from Midwestern State University and pursued his PhD at the University of North Texas. He later served as an adjunct professor at MSU and Vernon Regional Junior College, mentoring students and championing education at every level.

Outside of his ministry and civic work, Rev. Thompson was a voracious reader who built a personal library of hundreds of books. His collection spanned religious texts, history, cookbooks, philosophy, politics, and poetry, all reflecting his insatiable curiosity and intellectual depth.

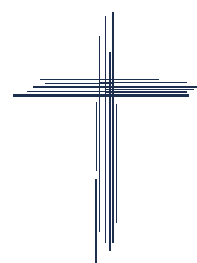
Legacy and Family

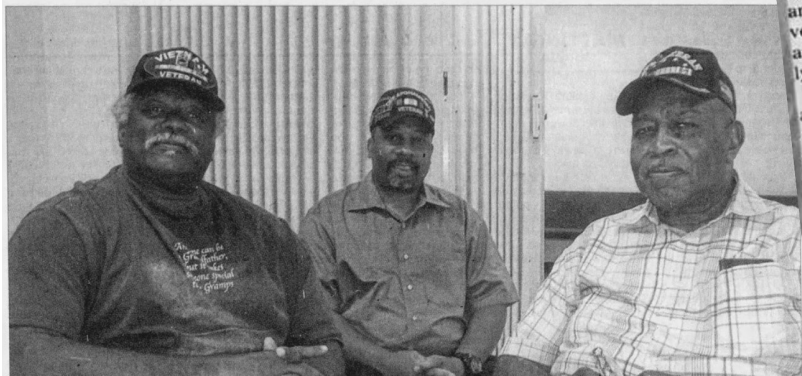

Defeat flatly unacceptable

It's a struggle against constantly rising odds, said Angus Thompson, executive director of Community Action Corp., Wichita Falls. But defeat is flatly unacceptable.

Budget cuts in federally funded social programs, a rising tide of racism and classism in America and a lack of a cohesive political base among low-income people and minorities in Wichita Falls are the mounting odds against solutions, to the problems of the poor. These solutions, Thompson said, won't come easy, but he insisted he won't be satisfied until relief is within grasp.

"Many people have been beaten down to the point where they say 'what's the use?' but I'm of the opinion that a lot of changes can be made and will be made if we just persevere," said the 42-year-old minister and director of the non-profit federally funded corporation.

"I and thousands of other Wichitans are dissatisfied with the way things are. And I don't think we will ever be satisfied until we can find a means to change these problems. Being dissatisfied with it means we are not going to stop trying to change it," he said.

Although CAC has benefited thousands of low-income persons in the North Texas area during the 11 years Thompson has headed the organization, Thompson said he doesn't view himself as a mover and shaker in the traditional sense of wielding

from and the hardships and problems that I endured," he said "I always try to remember that when I deal with other people, so I can be just with them."

Thompson, the father of four children, describes himself as a family man. He is a Baptist minister in Quannah and a scoutmaster besides being a member of National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, John's Healthcare Service board and the board of Texas Association of Community Action Agencies.

Especially in light of the administration's budget cut plans, Thompson said the ability to provide services to low-income people is becoming an ever-growing concern.

"It's rough just to keep body and soul together for many of these people, and I hope we can help them cope with everyday life," he said. "If I'm able to play even a small part in that, I'll be satisfied."

A stronger political base for the area's blacks and low-income residents is needed, he said. Obtaining that power, he added, would be aided by a ward system of electing city council members and a political coalition to organize votes such as does Citizens Committee for Good Government.

Although Thompson said he will continue to strive to build that political base, he has no intention of entering local politics.

"At one time I thought about running for city council; it's one of those dreams like many people have," he

Thompson, Farabee, Loughry win

Wichita Falls voters returned two of three City Council incumbents to their posts in landslide victories while the third fell in a heated contest with a former city employee.

In the only surprise of the night, incumbent Charles Thomas lost a dogfight for the District 1 seat as he garnered 45 percent of the vote, or 410 votes, to Terrance Loughry's 49 percent, or 450 votes. Giola Ozuna was a distance third in the race with 36 votes.

Incumbent David Farabee captured 71 percent, or 1,983 votes, to streak past his four challengers, including Claude Greer who received 291 votes; Dwain Welch, 96; Jay Carl Hager, 113; and William Johnson, 210.

In the District 2 race, incumbent Angus Thompson walked away with 86 percent of the vote, or 454 votes, to challenger Bill Cannon's 28 votes and Pearl Rodriguez LaChance's 34.

Loughry, 42, said his bid was successful because of the work of his supporters and by his walking of the district.

He said during those talks with his neighbors, one theme was consistent: "They didn't like the people in there."

For some voters in District 1, he said it was the first time a candidate had knocked on their doors in 15 or 20 years.

In a phone interview, Thomas, 59, blamed the *Times Record News* and other news media for his loss. He abruptly ended the interview.

Loughry worked for seven years as a city traffic engineer. He now owns the Creative

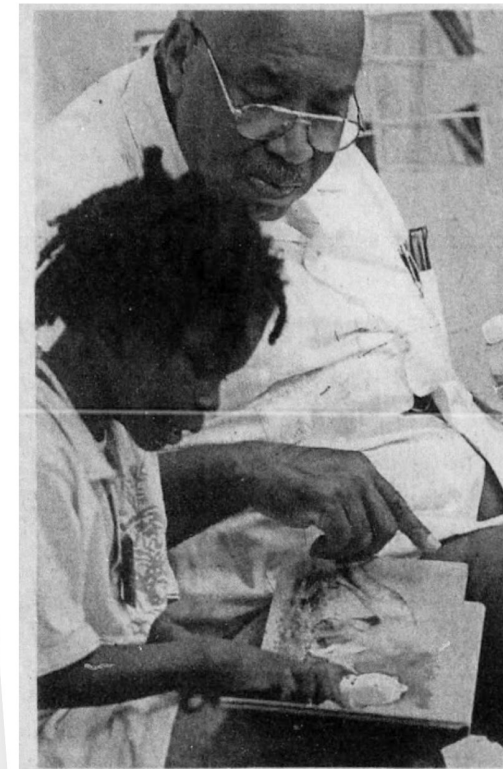

Cleanup Saturday in school vicinity

Operation Fresh Start targets Hirschi areas

Operation Fresh Start volunteers will launch their Clean-Up-Fix-Up Fall Campaign at 8 a.m. Saturday in ongoing efforts to spruce up neighborhoods around Hirschi High School.

The initiative is also expanding to the Kemp Addition in this latest campaign, the Rev. Angus Thompson, pastor of New Jerusalem Baptist Church, said.

"It was a beautiful, beautiful experience back in May when we had our first cleanup campaign," Thompson said. "I believe it will continue to cement the relationship between the schools and the neighborhoods."

Operation Fresh Start is a full-fledged initiative to improve communities surrounding Hirschi, as well as the Kemp Addition neighborhood, which is not near the high school.

"People that live in the communities will realize there are some things we can do to improve our areas," Thompson said.

Operation Fresh Start also seeks to form connections among students and staff at Hirschi, Kirby Middle School and Kate Burgess Elementary, local churches and neighbors.

While students from those schools won't be working in the Kemp Addition, they will volunteer in the other neighborhoods Saturday.

"They're going to learn that they can make contributions to the welfare of the common man, and we're excited about that," Thompson said. "We have some great kids, just wonderful young people."

The city will put dumpsters in place for yard waste, cut-up tree limbs and other trash for the cleanup.

Those dumpsters will be on the east side of Hirschi's east parking lot on
